Familiarity with professional ethical codes—such as those from the American Medical Association (AMA), the General Medical Council (GMC), or other relevant bodies—can add depth to your answers. Referencing these guidelines shows that you understand the standards expected in medical practice.

It's important to apply criteria consistently to avoid discrimination. I would also advocate for clear communication with patients and families about these difficult decisions." This reflects ethical awareness and practical reasoning.
