Choose cartoons that promote values like fairness, respect, and civic engagement rather than those that are overly cynical or divisive. Positive cartoons help build a constructive perspective on politics.

VISUAL APPEAL

BRIGHT COLORS, CLEAR DRAWINGS, AND RELATABLE CHARACTERS ARE MORE LIKELY TO CAPTURE CHILDREN'S INTEREST. VISUAL APPEAL IS KEY TO KEEPING KIDS ENGAGED AND MOTIVATED TO LEARN.

BENEFITS BEYOND POLITICS
